WARREN JOHANSON, Ph. D. - Columbia University

Dr. Johanson will speak on the union of Church and State under the ancient Regime and it's consequences for the law of sexual offences. His emphasis will be on two historical periods: the development of the sodomy laws in England and Germany between 1508 and 1563, and then in the United States and France between 1775 1810, showing that the Reformation did not affect the law on this subject in any way, but that the Enlightenment did produce a cleavage between the legal situation in France and that in the United States. He shall point out the relevance of his findings to our own Constitution.

Dr. Johanson was trained in Slavic and comparative philology at the University of Pennsylvania and Columbia University. He has served as Scientific/Technical Editor of the INTERNATIONAL JOURNAL OF GREEK LOVE and KALOS, and is collaborating with J.Z. Eglinton on a second edition of the book GREEK LOVE. He has been active in the Gay Academic Union since it's founding conference in November 1973, and is a member of the Scholarship Committee and of the Publications Committee, which produces the journal GAI SABER. With Wayne Dynes of Hunter College he is planning to co-author a book entitled EROS MYTH AND STIGMA: THE HISTORICAL SEMANTICS OF SEXUAL INTOLERANCE. Since 1952 he has been gathering material for a comprehensive study under the title HOMOSEXUALITY, PEDERASTY, INTERSEX-UALITY, which among other topics will deal with the origins of the sodomy delusion in Western Civilization and the movement to combat it in modern times.

THE SODOMY DELUSION

A complex of paranoid beliefs inculcated by the Christian Church in the Middle Ages, and still prevalent throughout Christendom, to the effect that non-procreative sexuality in general, and homosexual acts between males in particular, are contrary to the law of Nature, to the exercise of right reason, and to the will of God, that sodomy is practiced by individuals whose wills have been enslaved by demonic

that it is a crime committed by the merest handful of deprayed individusls

that everyone is susceptible of the demonic temptation to commit sodomy and potentially guilty of the crime but that it is ubiquitously threatening and infinitely contagious

but that the crime is hated and condemned everyehere and by everyone

that it is the cause of numberless catastrophes for the community that tolerates such practices in it's midst, that if allowed to spread unchecked it will result in the suicide of the human race, that it must be blotted entirely out of consciousness, memory and written record, and that the individuals guilty of such practices should be punished with the utmost severity and if not put to death in accordance with the Biblical injunction, then totally excluded from Christian society.

STEVEN T. KELBER, J.D. - COLEMAN & KELBER

Steven Kelber is twenty-six years old. He received his B.A. degree from the University of California in Economics in 1973. He was awarded his Jurum Doctor from the University of California at Los Angeles in 1976. He is the junior partner in the Law Firm of Coleman & Kelber, a general practice serving the Gay Community.

DONALD PIKE - LOS ANGELES SUPERIOR COURT COMMISSIONER

Donald Pike has been presiding over the Family Law Court, hearing disputes over custody, support, and visitation matters, since May of 1975. Prior to that, he was assigned to the Los Angeles County Juvenile Court where he heard matters of abandonment, child abuse, and juvenile crimes. He will speak on the accessibility of the Courts to same sex couples and selected problems peculiar to non-married couples.

He is principal investigator of three National Institute of Mental Health Projects. He is also editor of the *Journal of Homosexuality*.

Donald Knutson is Professor of Law at the University of Southern California. He is legal counsel for the *RELATIONSHIP OF CIVIL LIBERTIES AND SEXUAL ORIENTATION* project in CHEER. He is in private practice and is Director of Gay Rights Advocates.

MICHAEL G. SHIVELY, M.A. - CHEER

Michael Shively is associate director of CHEER. He is associate editor of the Journal of Homosexuality.

SALVATORE J. LICATA, Ph. D. - CHEER

Sal Licata is a research associate in CHEER. He is also Director of the National Archive of Homosexuality.

BOB PETERSEN, M.A. - CHEER

Bob Petersen is a research associate in CHEER. He is also associate director of the National Archive of Homosexuality.

PETRA LILJESTRAND, M.A. - CHEER

Petra Liljestrand is a research associate and investigator in CHEER.

Wendy Cutler is a Ph. D. candidate in the History of Cosciousness program at the University of California at Santa Cruz. She is a research assistant and interviewer in CHEER.

Brian Voakes is a research assistant in CHEER. He is an undergraduate in psychology at San Francisco State University.

The general purpose of this research project is to study issues that arise in conflicts that homosexual men and women have in public or private institutions. A conflict is defined as a situation in which one party was perceived by another party as threatening to take or taking action against them. Conflicts must involve persons whose civil liberties may have been abridged because of their femininity, masculinity or sexual orientation. Institutional settings for conflict include the following: education, law enforcement, health services, licensing, public accomodation and housing, family, social rehabilitation, immigration and naturalization, military, organizations, financial institutions, business and industry, and professional services.

To be interviewed for this study the individual must be twenty-one or older. The study began in January 1975 and will continue through 1980. The locals for interviewing will be the San Francisco and New York metropolitan areas. The interview schedule includes: 1) Questions about the conflict incidents; 2) Questions about the perceived femininity and masculinity of the parties; and 3) Questions about the sexual orientation of the parties. All interviews and reports are strictly confidential.

Answers to questions about femininity and masculinity will be used to study the relationship between social sex-role stereotyping and the abridgement of civil liberties. A major research question is the following: Do men and women, whose behavior perceptibly departs from the social sex-role stereotypes, experience the abridgement of their right of equality.

The interview will also examine issues of sexual orientation to determine the relationship between violations of civil liberties and knowledge or assumption of the homosexual orientation.

The study will strengthen the protection of the civil liberties of men and women who belong to social sex-role or sexual orientation minorities. Results will be published in the form of articles and a book.

JERRY WELLER, B.A. - PORTLAND TOWN COUNCIL

Jerry Weller is also a Commissioner of the Metropolitan Human Relations Commission of Multnomah County, Oregon. Mr. Weller's occupational background is diverse. In the spring of 1978 he managed the political campaign of a candidate for Multnomah County Commission. Previous to that he was Executive Director of the Portland Town Council, Oregon's major gay civil rights organization. In the past he has worked as the teaching-principal of a small, rural grammar school in central Maine and various positions in Florida, California, and central Pennsylvania.

It was in central Pennsylvania in 1974-1976 that Mr. Weller began his gay rights work. He was a board member and secretary of Homophiles of Penn State and attended many of the initial meetings of the Pennsylvania Task Force for Sexual Minorities. He also wrote a regular gay column in the area's alternative culture newspaper. He was a member of the State College Committee for a Human Relations Ordinance.

Upon moving to Oregon in 1976, Mr. Weller became Executive Director of the Portland Town Council. The Portland Town Council published A Legislative Guide to Gay Rights and lobbied effectively for the formation of and was the official advisory body to the Oregon Department of Human Resources Ad Hoc Task Force on Sexual Preference. Mr. Weller was Cochair of the finance committee of Eugene Citizens for Human Rights, the organization formed to fight the repeal of that city's gay rights ordinance. He currently resides in Portland, Oregon with his lover of eight years.





PARTIES AND VENUE

1.

Plaintiff NATIONAL COMMITTEE FOR SEXUAL CIVIL LIBERTIES (hereinafter 'the committee') is a committee of the Sexual Law Reporter, Inc., a not for profit corporation duly organized under the non-profit corporation laws of the State of California, and recognized as tax exempt under both the California Revenue and Taxation Code and the United States Internal Revenue Code. Plaintiff Committee is composed of approximately twenty nine (29) of whom are gay. * The COMM-ITTEE holds a meeting annually at various locations throughout the United States at which members and invited guests discuss and plan

various ways to secure through the judicial process, civil rights which are denied on the basis of sexual orientation. At these meetings, the COMMITTEE schedules seminars and panel discussions at which particular members and certain invited guests lecture on specific problems having to do with the denial of civil rights based on sexual orientation, after which the members of the COMMITTEE discuss the issues raised in the presentation, and various solutions to the problems which have been highlighted. In recent years, the COMMITTEE's programs have focused more and more on the problems of securing basic civil rights for gay women and men.

To make the aforementioned meetings possible, the members of the COMMITTEE authorize it to secure lodging and suitable accomodations for all members and invited guests in the city in which a meeting is to be held. The members also authorize the COM-MITTEE to secure public meeting rooms in which the aforementioned meetings and discussions may be held. In 1977, the members of the COMMITTEE authorized it to arrange for suitable lodging and meeting rooms for a meeting to be held in San Francisco in late June and early July, 1978.

111

Pursuant to the authorization of it's members, as alleged more specificly herein, plaintiff COMMITTEE attempted to arrange lodging and suitable accomodations for all of the COMMITTEE and anticipated guests for the meeting to be held in San Francisco from June 30, 1978 through July 3, 1978. The defendants, as alleged herein, refused the plaintiff COMMITTEE lodging for each of it's members and guests and refused the COMMITTEE use of public meeting rooms.

The term 'gay' is a descriptive term which in recent years has come to be preferred by those whose sexual preference is for members of their own sex. This complaint adopts this preferred self-description of such individuals.

Plaintiff CAUDILLO is, and at all times mentioned herein was, a resident of the City and County of San Francisco. Plaintiff COMMITTEE is, and at all times mentioned herein was, a committee of the Sexual Law Reporter, Inc., a duly organized California corporation as aforementioned, having it's principal place of business in the County of Los Angeles.

V.

Plaintiffs CAUDILLO and the COMMITTEE bring this action on behalf of themselves, all members of the COMMITTEE, and all guests who were invited to the meeting scheduled for July, 1978 in San Francisco.The members of this class are readily ascertainable. There is a well defined community of interest in all questions of law and fact affecting the parties to the action, and all claims are based on common questions of fact and law. The injury to each member of the class and the damage claims based thereon are identical. Thus the claims of the representative parties are typical of the claims of the class, and the representative parties will fairly and adequately protect the interests of the class.

VI.

The injury upon which this action is based occured in the City and County of San Francisco.

VII

Defendant, THE SHERATON CO-RPORATION (hereinafter SHE-RATON) is, and at all times mentioned herein was, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Delaware and doing bussiness in the State of California, City and County of San Francisco.

VIII.

Plaintiffs are ignorant of the true names and capacities of defendants sued herein as DOES I-IV, inclusive, and therefore sue these defendants by such fictitious names. Plaintiffs will amend this complaint to allege their true names and capacities when ascertained. Plaintiffs are informed and believe that each of such fictitiously named defendants is responsible in some manner for the occurrences herein alleged and that plaintiffs' injuries as herein alleged were proximately caused by the aforementioned

defendants.

IX.

At all times mentioned herein, defendants VAN WOODWORTH and DOES I - IV were the agents and employees of defendant SHER-ATON, and in doing the things herein alleged, were acting within the scope of such agency.

CAUSE OF ACTION

X.

At all times mentioned herein, defendant SHERATON was the operator of the Sheraton-Palace Hotel, a business establishment engaged in the business of renting hotel rooms, meeting rooms, and other facilities to the general public.

XI.

To pursue the goals of the COMM-ITTEE as aforementioned, the members planned a meeting of all the members of the COMMITTEE and six invited guests to be held in San Francisco, from June 30, 1978 through July 3, 1978. At said meeting the members of the COMM-ITTEE planned to hear presentations and discuss problems of securing civil rights for sexual minorities. Most, if not all of the program was devoted to the particular problems associated with securing civil rights for gay woman and men.

XII

Pursuant to the authorization of its members as aforesaid, plaintiff COMMITTEE undertook to secure suitable accomodations and public meeting rooms in San Francisco for the period of June 30, 1978 through July 3, 1978, for all of its members and the guests invited to the metting. To achieve this goal, the COMMITTEE authorized plaintiff CAUDILLO to make the necessary arrangements.

XIII.

On or about March I8, I978, plaintiff COMMITTEE, acting through its agent, plaintiff CAUDILLO, telephoned defendant VAN WOOD-WORTH and asked for the terms on which twenty (20) rooms for its members and guests and a public meeting room would be rented from June 30, I978 through July 3, I978. Defendant VAN WOOD-

WORTH indicated the terms on which defendant SHERATON would rent such rooms, and invited plaintiff CAUDILLO to come to defendants place of business to arrange such rental.

XIV.

On or about March 19, 1978, plaintiff CAUDILLO, acting for plaintiff COMMITTEE, went to defendants' place of business in the City and County of San Francisco, expressed a desire to rent the aforesaid rooms from June 30, 1978 through July 3, 1978, and indicated plaintiff COM-MITTEE'S willingness to pay the amount requested by defendants. At that time, defendant VAN WOODWORTH became aware that plaintiff COMMITTEE was an organization devoted to securing the rights of gay women and men, that many, if not most, of the plantiff's members were gay, and that plain-tiff COMMITTEE's discussion program would be almost exclusively devoted to the topic of the civil rights of gay women and men. Upon becoming so aware, said defendant for the first time indicated doubt as to whether or not said lodging rooms would be available for use during the period for which they were requested.

XV

On or about March 21, 1978, defendant VAN WOODWORTH indicated to plaintiff CAUDILLO that said lodging or meeting rooms would not be available for use on any of the days during the period for which they were requested. On or about May I0, I978, defendant VAN WOODWORTH again told plaintiff CAUDILLO that said lodging rooms and said public meeting rooms had not been available for any of the days during the period from June 30, 1978 through July 3, 1978, and had remained unavailable for all four days continuously until May 10, 1978, and remained unavailable. In fact, such lodging and meeting rooms remained available for use during all that period for some time thereafter.

XVI.

Plaintiffs are informed and believe, and therefore allege that defendants refused plaintiff COMMITTEE, its members, including CAUDILLO, and its invited guests the use of the lodging and meeting rooms and other accomodations for any or all

of the following arbitrary reasons: I) because most of plaintiff COMM-ITTEE's members are gay; 2) because plaintiff COMMITTEE's members and guests seek to secure civil rights for gay women and men as a class; 3) because defendants assumed that all plaintiff COMMITTEE members and guests are gay; 4) because plaintiff COMMITTEE's program was largely devoted to securing civil rights for gay women and men.

XVII.

As a result of the wrongful acts of defendants, plaintiffs are entitled to recover statutory damages in the sum of \$250.00 as provided in Section 52 of the Civil Code for each time each of plaintiff COMMITTEE members and guests were denied rooms and accomodations, and for each time plaintiff COMMITTEE was denied the use of the meeting rooms.

XVIII.

Defendants did the acts herein alleged willfully, maliciously and oppressively. Plaintiffs are therefore entitled to exemplary or punitive damages in the sum of \$350,000 (three hundred and fifty thousand dollars).

WHEREFORE, plaintiffs pray judgment as follows:

- I. For statutory damages pursuant to Section 52 of the Civil Code in the sum of \$36,000;
- 2. For punitive or exemplary damages in the sum of \$350,000;
- 3. For attorneys' fees;
- 4. For costs of suit herein incurred;
- 5. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem necessary and proper.
